Please find below an invitation to submit a proposal for a two-day training programme from 27 to 28 February 2018 on Industry Engagement in Transnational Education (TNE) for teams of approximately 30 management professionals or lecturers from Thai higher education institutions.

Overview of the British Council	<p>British Council is the United Kingdom’s international organisation for cultural relations and educational opportunities. Context	<p>British Council Thailand has been working collaboratively with the Thai Office of the Higher Education Commission (OHEC) and selected higher education institutions to develop joint or double/dual degree programmes with UK institutions.</p> <p>Building on the success of the Year 1 Project, the UK-Thailand Transnational Education Development Project Year 2 — Gearing towards Thailand 4.0 and sustainable development — has been expanded to all Thai and UK higher education institutions.</p> <p>The project aims to provide support for Thai and UK higher education institutions to develop further partnerships, particularly in transnational education, and create new education programmes to prepare an appropriate workforce for supporting the Thailand 4.0 initiative and social enterprise. Note about the Thailand 4.0 initiative

Thailand 4.0 is a new economic model for transforming Thailand into a value-based economy. The Thai government has defined 10 new engines of growth for the country. The first S-Curve is about enhancing current industries towards continued growth, while the new S-Curve relates to the development of future industries to achieve a leap of growth for the Thai economy.



Scope of Work/Specification/Outputs

Objective:

To provide knowledge and training for delegates from 12 participating Thai higher education institutions to become more effectively engaged with industry in developing a TNE programme.

Outputs:

- A two-day workshop on industry engagement in TNE programmes. The training content should consist of, but not limited to:
 - best practice, lessons learnt and case studies on industry engagement in developing a TNE programme
 - understanding possible processes and ways of becoming more effectively engaged with industry in developing a TNE programme
 - industry’s perspectives on partnering with HEIs
 - opportunities, challenges and key success factors

Outcome:

- Representatives from each Thai institution will be able to develop a TNE programme, with continual engagement from industry.

<p>Key Background Information:</p>	<p>The UK is the leading global provider of TNE programmes, with approximately 700,000 students actively enrolled, involving around 80% of UK universities. This indicates that TNE in the UK is expanding all around the world. 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The responses under each section will be scored based on the following matrix:

15	A comprehensive and strong answer indicating the supplier is fully capable and experienced to deliver the required outcomes. A detailed response that directly responds to all requirements with no ambiguity and relevant examples provided.
12	There are slight concerns that the supplier will not be able to achieve all the outcomes required and response lacked details of relevant experience. A less detailed response that broadly responds to the requirement with some ambiguity and few relevant examples provided.
10	There are concerns that the supplier will not be able to achieve the outcomes required and response significantly lacks details of relevant experience. A less detailed response that broadly responds to the requirement with some ambiguity and no/irrelevant examples provided.
5	There are serious indications that the supplier will not be able to achieve the outcomes required and has not provided appropriate evidence of experience to successfully deliver the outcomes required. A response that is not entirely relevant to the requirement, with ambiguity and lacking specific detail.
0	The answer is non-compliant and/or no relevant information has been received to demonstrate the supplier can achieve the required outcomes. No response or a response that is entirely irrelevant.

The lowest all-inclusive cost proposed will receive 30% as per the evaluation criteria. All other submissions will be allocated a % score pro-rata.

The final evaluation score will then be calculated for each response by adding together the scores for each section.
