

What are Queen Elizabeth Commonwealth Scholarships?

The Queen Elizabeth Commonwealth Scholarship scheme is owned by and for Commonwealth governments. Hosted by leading universities in low and middle-income Commonwealth countries, the scheme provides awards for Commonwealth citizens to study for a Master's-level qualification.

Awards are fully funded through the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan (CSFP) endowment fund, which has been supported with donations from 14 Commonwealth governments, many Commonwealth scholarship alumni, and organisations. The ACU manages the administration of this inter-governmental fund and its scholarships.

Queen Elizabeth Commonwealth Scholarships support scholars who are highly engaged in their communities to gain a Master's award in another country, building their academic profile and connecting with international networks to help effect positive change across the globe.

Hosted in 20 different countries to date, no other scholarship scheme offers such variety in experience and connections across the Commonwealth.



The cause

Commonwealth Scholarships are one of the Commonwealth's most widely recognised brands. They have been offered between member nations since 1959, maintaining and improving international relations and creating mutual understanding through an alumni network of over 35,000 people. The common language and legal systems, shared values, and commitment to liberal democracy and human rights binds Commonwealth countries together, providing a natural framework for cooperation on global challenges through the active collaboration of highly engaged citizens.

The Queen Elizabeth Commonwealth Scholarship scheme ensures that the opportunity to host Commonwealth Scholarships is available to all countries. Host countries offer access to expertise in new and emerging fields, contributing to knowledge sharing between Commonwealth nations.

This innovative mechanism for supporting south-south as well as north-south mobility, expands the number of scholarships available to developing countries, helping to strengthen capacity and build bridges through mobility and research collaboration. Queen Elizabeth scholars will work in their home and host countries, solving global challenges and collaborating to secure sustainability in the future Commonwealth.

Increasing both the number and the geographic reach of these prestigious scholarships also contributes directly to Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 4B.

'By 2020, substantially expand globally the number of scholarships available to developing countries, in particular least developed countries, small island developing states and African countries, for enrolment in higher education.'

The Queen Elizabeth Commonwealth Scholarships will launch fully in 2019 to coincide with the 70th anniversary of the Commonwealth, the 60th anniversary of the CSFP and the 10th anniversary of the CSFP endowment fund.

The true value of the CSFP stems from its ability to create mobility across the Commonwealth. Rather than just encouraging typical south-to-north or north-to-south movement, Queen Elizabeth Commonwealth Scholarships provide opportunities for all Commonwealth nations to host and send scholars.
