1 Overview of the British Council

2 Introduction and Background to the Project / Programme

2.1 English Programmes

Our work in English Programmes supports governments to build sustainable education systems, empowers teachers to improve their practice, and enables learners to access life-changing opportunities. English Programmes has the following impact areas:

- TeachingEnglish Connect with English teachers and teacher educators worldwide and find opportunities, resources, and support for your career through our global online TeachingEnglish community.
- b) English in Education Through our own expertise and in collaboration with sector experts in the UK, we partner with overseas governments to improve the teaching, learning and assessment of English in their countries.

c) English and Empowerment – We provide opportunities for individuals in areas where English and other language education can help build resilience, develop agency and voice, and support academic and career goals.

2.2 Background Context (see section 7 for detailed Specification)

The reintroduction of English in primary schools as a compulsory subject is set to be implemented in 2024 by the Government of Indonesia under the Ministry of Education, Culture, Research and Technology (MoECRT)'s 2018 Emancipated curriculum (Kurikulum Merdeka). While the details of the policy roll out and the mechanism are still in development, current expectations are that a three-year (2024-2027) English language teacher professional development programme could be implemented for 180,000 inservice English language teachers across Indonesia.

As a precursor to this, between February and August 2024, British Council Indonesia will be trialling online professional development interventions to a group of 500 in-service primary and secondary teachers (CEFR levels A2 and B1). These interventions will be supported by teacher educators (e-moderators). These current interventions will need to be evaluated, as part of this consultancy, to assess their quality and potential.

This consultancy is due to commence in **March 2024 and conclude by October 2024** (see section 10 for time frame and deliverables).

2.3 Aims and objectives of this Consultancy

To better understand how a national programme of teacher CPD could best be designed and delivered to meet the needs of teachers and the ambition of the MOCERT in order to strengthen the teaching, learning and assessment of English in Indonesia, British Council Indonesia is seeking suitably qualified and experienced consultant(s) to complete the following assignment.

Building on existing available research and insight:

- to describe current CPD provision for primary and secondary English language teachers
- to analyse the professional development needs of primary and secondary English language teachers
- to evaluate the quality and potential of training interventions currently being trialled by British Council
 Indonesia

And from this:

To make recommendations that will inform the design, delivery and evaluation of a teacher CPD
programme that will contribute to the long-term strengthening of the teaching, learning and
assessment of English in Indonesia.

While this needs analysis is being commissioned by British Council Indonesia (in consultation with MoECRT), the findings and recommendations will be made publicly available. It is expected that the outputs and recommendations can form an exemplar of best practice that MoECRT (and other interested

stakeholders) can reference in designing and implementing future CPD interventions for English language teachers in Indonesia.

3 Proposal Conditions and Contractual Requirements

- 3.1.4 Contractual terms: As set out at Annex 1 ("Contract"). By submitting a Proposal, you are agreeing to be bound by the terms of this RFP and the Contract without further negotiation or amendment. In the event that the chosen service provider is operating as a Sole Trader or through a Personal Service Company, the British Council retain the right to issue specific contractual terms and conditions, in order to take account of this status. - 3.3.5 <u>Amendments to the RFP</u> At any time prior to the Response Deadline, the British Council may amend the RFP and if appropriate, the Response Deadline shall, at the discretion of the British Council, be extended.
- 3.3.6 <u>Compliance of Proposal</u> Any goods and/or services offered should be on the basis of and strictly in accordance with the RFP (including, without limitation, any specification of the British Council's requirements, these Proposal Conditions and the Contract) and all other documents and any clarifications or updates issued by the British Council as part of this Procurement Process.
- 3.3.7 <u>Compliance with the terms of the Contract</u> The successful supplier must comply with the Contract as set out in Annex 1 without any amendment (save as described in paragraph 3.1.4).
- 3.3.8 <u>Format of Proposal</u> Proposals must comprise the relevant documents as detailed by the British Council in Annex 2 (Supplier Proposal) completed in accordance with relevant all instructions. Any documents requested by the British Council must be completed in full. It is important that you read the RFP carefully before completing and submitting your Proposal.

4 Confidentiality and Information Governance

- 4.2 You shall not disclose, copy or reproduce any of the information supplied to you as part of this Procurement Process other than for the purposes of preparing and submitting a Proposal. There must be

no publicity by you regarding the Procurement Process or the future award of any contract unless the British Council has given express written consent to the relevant communication.

- 4.3 The British Council reserves the right to disclose all documents relating to this Procurement Process, including without limitation your Proposal, to any employee, third party agent, adviser or other third party involved in the Procurement Process in support of, and/or in collaboration with, the British Council. The British Council further reserves the right to publish the Contract once awarded and/or disclose information in connection with supplier performance under the Contract in accordance with any public sector transparency policies (as referred to below). By participating in this Procurement Process, you agree to such disclosure and/or publication by the British Council in accordance with such rights reserved by it under this paragraph.

7 Specification

British Council Indonesia English Programmes would like to request a research consultancy proposal from a supplier, partnership or consortium which demonstrates both an in depth understanding of Indonesia's education system, ELT landscape and teacher development sector and an excellent understanding of international best practice in ELT, teacher development and system change.

7.1 Overall aim and objectives

To better understand how a national programme of teacher CPD can best be designed and delivered to meet the needs of teachers and the ambition of the MOCERT in order to strengthen the teaching, learning and assessment of English in Indonesia.

Building on existing available research and insight:

- to describe current CPD provision for primary and secondary English language teachers
- to analyse the professional development needs of primary and secondary English language teachers
- to evaluate the quality and potential of training interventions currently being trialled by British Council Indonesia

And from this:

• To make recommendations that will inform the design, delivery and evaluation of a teacher CPD programme that will contribute to the long-term strengthening of the teaching, learning and assessment of English in Indonesia.

While this research is being commissioned by British Council Indonesia (in consultation with MoECRT), the research findings and recommendations will be made publicly available.

7.2 Context

English is currently taught as a compulsory subject in lower secondary (2-3 times x 45 minutes per week) and high school (3-4 x 45 minutes per week). Most private schools teach English from grade 1 and some state primary schools teach English as an optional subject. English was taught as a compulsory subject in primary schools until 2013 starting at grade 4. Since then it has been optional.

The reintroduction of English in primary schools as a compulsory subject is set to be implemented in 2024 under the new 2018 Emancipated curriculum (Kurikulum Merdeka). This reintroduction of English will be undertaken by voluntarily adoption to the school curriculum based on their readiness i.e. teacher's availability and other aspects that will be evaluated through self-assessment by the schools. The details of the policy roll out and the mechanism are still in development, but current expectations are that a three-year (2024-2027) English language teacher professional development programme could be implemented for 180,000 in-service English language teachers across Indonesia.

To expand, between 2024 and 2027, MoECRT are currently considering how best to support teacher professional development by both training primary teachers to support the reintroduction of English in

primary schools while also taking this opportunity to improve the English proficiency and pedagogical skills and knowledge of secondary teachers. This is estimated to impact 180,000 in-service primary and secondary English language teachers. Currently there is no comprehensive data on teachers' proficiency levels. Such interventions may take place with or without the direct involvement of British Council Indonesia.

As a precursor to this, between February and August 2024, British Council Indonesia will be trialling online professional development interventions to a group of 500 in-service primary and secondary teachers (CEFR levels A2 and B1). These interventions will be supported by teacher educators (e-moderators). These current interventions will also need to be evaluated, as part of this consultancy, to assess their quality and potential.

7. 3 Existing desk-research

- In 2023, British Council Indonesia commissioned the 'English Teacher Professional Development in Indonesia' Report. Currently, the draft is being finalized [expected February 2024] but it includes the following sections, which can inform this needs analysis assignment:
 - Section 3 How to become an English teacher [focuses on Initial Teacher Education for pre-service English teachers in Indonesia]
 - Section 4 How to develop your professional practice as an English teacher [focuses on existing CPD opportunities for in-service English teachers in Indonesia]
- In addition, two research pieces have been conducted by MoECRT's Centre for Education Policy (only available in Indonesian for national team members to review and extract insight)

7.4 Comprehensive needs analysis - areas to be researched

In reviewing current provision and existing research and information gathering exercises (7.3 above) we envisage a focus on the following areas (and canvassing associated stakeholders as part of this needs analysis consultancy to scope key areas, specifically.

- In-service teacher and teacher educator communities including analysis of existing
 English proficiency data; sampling of language teaching pedagogical skills, knowledge and
 confidence, demographic data (age, gender, disability, regionality), opportunities and
 incentives for in-service CPD participation and any barriers or challenges identified to
 participation e.g. workload, motivation, etc.
- System readiness including current system for the provision of in-service (and to a limited extent, pre-service) English language teacher education and professional development by MoECRT and regional training centre (e.g. Balai Besar Guru Penggerak and Balai Guru Penggerak) and local stakeholders. In addition, reference MoECRT's ambition and strategic direction for CPD, levels of appetite and enthusiasm for change amongst school leaders and administrators; readiness of teacher education systems and personnel; curriculum, resources, and assessments systems.

- Equity Given the huge geographic spread, rural-urban differences and socio-economic
 variance across Indonesia we will explore how wider inequalities can be overcome to ensure
 equitable implementation of the programme. Also consider attitudes of parents and other
 community groups towards English language teaching, learning and assessment.
- Gender Indonesia's gender inequality index is amongst the highest for ASEAN. Given that 70% of Indonesia's primary teachers are women, a gender analysis will ensure women who may have additional caring responsibilities can participate and succeed on any CPD programme.
- Online connectivity Given the importance of online delivery to any CPD programme
 models, the needs analysis will document variability in connectivity; hardware and software
 requirements and levels of digital literacy across schools and the in-service teaching
 community.
- In addition to the above, between February and August 2024, British Council Indonesia will be trialling online professional development interventions to a group of 500 in-service primary and secondary teachers. These interventions will be supported by teacher educators (e-moderators).
 These trial interventions will also need to be evaluated, as part of this consultancy, to assess their effectiveness.
- Assessment tools used for monitoring e.g. language proficiency baseline (MoECRT used English Score to assess), and endline (TBC), teacher pedagogy and confidence (adapted from British Council *Teaching for Success* Self-assessment tool for baseline and endline self-reporting).

Following the above activities, the consultant(s) are to make recommendations that will inform the design, delivery and evaluation of a teacher CPD programme that will contribute to the long-term strengthening of the teaching, learning and assessment of English in Indonesia.

- Learning pathways outline a range of CPD models that could work in the Indonesian context to support teacher needs and wants and deliver systemic change
- · Effective monitoring, evaluation and learning

7.5 Methodology and tools

The appointed consultants will be expected to not only conduct desk research but also visit government schools, teacher education and development institutions, observe English lessons and conduct focus groups discussions with key stakeholders including students, teachers, teacher educators, principals and administrators. Based on the supplier response, an inception report confirming the approach and methods to be used, and the rationale underpinning it, will be expected to be developed and submitted by 31 March 2024.

- Scoping interviews
- Desk-based research
- Questionnaires and surveys
- Classroom Observations

- Interviews and focus group discussions with key stakeholders
- Focus group discussions with key stakeholders
- Assessment analyse English language proficiency (and any other) assessments that are available from MoECRT

7.6 Outputs/deliverables

- End of March 2024 Inception: confirming the approach and methods to be used for the needs analysis consultancy assignment
- End of May 2024 Desk review progress report: reporting initial findings from desk-research to date including current provision, context, needs, MoECRT ambitions, etc.
- Early August 2024 M&E report: outlining the initial findings from the assessment of the British Council Indonesia trial interventions (Feb-August 2024)
- End of September 2024 Final report with recommendations: summarising the findings
 (current versus desired provision, British Council trial evaluation, possible CPD interventions)
 and recommendations for future CPD interventions in the form of programme design options
 for consideration
- TBC Dissemination activities

The selected expert(s)/consultancy team is expected to report to the British Council English Programmes Indonesia team at key milestones to be agreed as part of the Inception stage.

7.7. Qualification Requirements

- 7.7.1. As part of your tender response, you must provide all information required in the Supplier Proposal (Annex 2). A failure to submit all information shall entitle the British Council to reject a tender response in full.
- 7.7.2. This Request for Proposal is open to International/UK and/or Indonesian organisations specialising in research and consultation within the ELT sector. It is envisaged that the assignment will be undertaken by a team of national and international experts, suitably qualified and experienced not only in Indonesian's education system, ELT landscape and the teacher development sector but also best practice in ELT more broadly, which meet the following criteria:
 - Minimum of 5 years of experience in developing and delivering research and consultations
 - Preferably have a team which consist of national and international experts
 - Good organisation and communication skills
 - Good project management skills to ensure smooth delivery

7.8. Budget

The anticipated budget ceiling for this consultancy is £45,000 (inclusive VAT if applicable) and Annex 2 (supplier proposal) and Annex 3 (pricing approach) should be used to detail the number of input days required for key stage activities and the associate budget requirements.

The British Council is under no obligation to respond to clarification requests and will response if the question is appropriate and received before the Clarification Deadline.
- 12.2 Any clarification requests should clearly reference the appropriate paragraph in the RFP documentation and, to the extent possible, should be aggregated rather than sent individually.
- 12.3 The British Council reserves the right to issue any clarification request made by you, and the response, to all potential suppliers unless you expressly require it to be kept confidential at the time the request is made. If the British Council considers the contents of the request not to be confidential, it will inform you and you will have the opportunity to withdraw the clarification query prior to the British Council responding to all potential suppliers.
- 12.4 The British Council may at any time request further information from potential suppliers to verify or clarify any aspects of their Proposal or other information they may have provided. Should you not provide supplementary information or clarifications to the British Council by any deadline notified to you, your Proposal may be rejected in full and you may be disqualified from this Procurement Process.

13 Evaluation Criteria

13.1 You will have your Proposal evaluated as set out below:

Stage 1: Proposals will be checked to ensure that they have been completed correctly and all necessary information has been provided. responses correctly completed with all relevant information being provided and all mandatory requirements as outlined in Section 8 met will proceed to Stage 2. Any Proposal not correctly completed in accordance with the requirements of this RFP and/or containing omissions may be rejected at this point. Where a Proposal is rejected at this point it will automatically be disqualified and will not be further evaluated. ↓

Stage 2: If a bidder succeeds in passing Stages 1 of the evaluation, then it will have its Proposal evaluated in accordance with the evaluation methodology set out below.

13.2 <u>Award Criteria</u> – Responses from potential suppliers will be assessed to determine the most economically advantageous proposal using the following criteria and weightings and will be assessed entirely on your response submitted:

13.3 <u>Scoring Model</u> – Proposals will be subject to an initial review at the start of Stage 2 of the evaluation process. Any Proposals not meeting mandatory requirements or constraints (if any) will be rejected in full at this point and will not be assessed or scored further. Proposals not so rejected will be scored by an evaluation panel appointed by the British Council for all criteria other than Commercial using the following scoring model:

- 13.4 <u>Commercial Evaluation</u> Your "Overall Price" (as calculated in accordance with requirements of Annex 3 (Pricing Approach) for the goods and/or services will be evaluated by the evaluation panel for the purposes of the commercial evaluation, further information on this approach may be available in Annex 3. In the event that any prices are expressed as being subject to any pricing assumptions, qualifications or indexation not provided for by the British Council as part of the pricing approach, the British Council may reject the full Proposal at this point. The British Council may also reject any Proposal where the Overall Price for the goods and/or services is considered by the British Council to be abnormally low following the relevant processes set out under the procurement rules. A maximum offer score of 10 will be awarded to the Proposal offering the lowest "Overall Price". Other Proposals will be awarded a mark by application of the following formula: (Lowest Overall Price/Overall Price being evaluated) x 10 (rounded to two decimal places) = commercial score.
- 13.5 <u>Moderation and application of weightings</u> The evaluation panel appointed for this Procurement Process will meet to agree and moderate scores for each award criteria. Final scores in terms of a percentage of the overall Proposal score will be obtained by applying the relevant weighting factors set out as part of the award criteria table above. The percentage scores for each award criteria will be amalgamated to give a percentage score out of 100.
- 13.6 <u>The Winning Proposal(s)</u> when applying the above evaluation methodology, which is also supported by any required verification evidence (to include, without limitation, any updated information)] obtained by the Authority relating to any self-certification or other requirements referred to at any time in this Procurement Process.
