
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





Total number of pupils in ISC schools (source: Independent Schools Council)




Total number of students in UK higher education at undergraduate level (source: HESA)




Number of students with a valid permit in calendar year, Canada, all levels (source: CIC)




Number of students with a valid permit in calendar year, Canada, all levels (source: CIC)

Summary

- Korea seems to be sending less students to English speaking destinations for higher education, with the UK being the exception to this rule.
- This trend is reflected in UK schools
- Thailand is sending more students to the UK and Canada at HE and schools level. Less students are going to US institutions.
- There is a stronger link between pre-university and university study in the UK amongst Thai students than Korean students.



Insights from agents

- UK pre-university market is expected to grow further in the next 3 years
- Earlier start better result!
- New sources of students: EP Programmes, bilingual schools, international schools in Thailand
- Entry requirements tailor-made to local context
- Integration programmes are invaluable to help deal with culture shock
- UK visa application process is not a problem importance of updates and communication
- Exchange rate is positive to UK market

Top 3 priorities for Thai parents and students

- Reasons to study abroad : Immersion in English, quality of education, life skills
- How to choose a country: Quality of education, safety, immersion in English
- How to choose a school/ collage: Safety, opportunities to mix with local students, accreditation by a recognised organisation
- How to find information: Go online,
 attend seminars or education fairs, contact educational agents

- 60% intend to apply to schools through educational agents


Thai government scholarships: ODOS

- Approximately 900 scholars/batch to study in 47 countries for a first degree




- Expanded to English speaking countries in Batch 3
- Available in different subject areas, focus on science


The UK is one of the top 10 countries receiving ODOS students

Summary & Recommendations

- Positive trend for UK market but also consistent growth in competing markets

South Koreans could be 'extinct' by 2750



Many developed economies are facing demographic problems. But one case that stands out is South Korea.

Not only is the population aging (like in Japan and the US), but birthrates are also falling and women are increasingly less inclined to get married.

In 2013, the country's birth rate plummeted to the lowest level on record: Only 8.6 babies per 1,000 South Koreans were born, and the

Economics

Education spend comes from household incomes

People have less disposable household income, but are still likely to invest in education

English language learning

Improving English language skills third most important reason for studying abroad, after cultural experience of living abroad, and better quality of education (source: British Council Student Insight survey)

Simplified entrance policy to special purpose high schools, especially foreign language high schools, has impacted demand for English language learning.

Employability

- Ministry of Education in Korea has placed restrictions on the English language education market
- Public and private providers have started to generate good alternative services to meet the demand
- Local universities are no longer allowed to offer preferable entrance to overseas graduates by law
- Employers are focussing more on skills and experience rather than provenance of education British Council survey of HR managers from Top 25 companies
- This partly explains the data showing those dropping rates of number of students & visa acquired for US,
 Canada and Australia in Korea for the last 5 years


Yoon Jeong-sik, a 30-year-old who has studied in the U.S. for half of his life, has struggled to find a job in Korea. Having graduated with a bachelor's degree in political philosophy from a state university in California, Yoon has remained unemployed for almost two years since finishing his mandatory military service.

"I thought the applicant like me who speaks fluent English and has work experience would have little trouble getting a job in Korea," said Yoon.


He applied to more than 30 companies, his confidence buoyed by the fact that he had received a "global education" in the U.S. since he was in elementary school. "Now I am afraid that my 15-year endeavor in the U.S. will come to nothing," he said.

Total number of students in UK higher education at undergraduate level (source: HESA)



Summary and recommendations

- The number of Koreans studying abroad is generally in decline
- UK higher education remains popular, but this is not translated into pre-university study in the UK
- Demographic decline, employability issues and a variety of other cultural factors means that demand for UK-pre-university education from Koreans will likely not increase over the next few years.
- Working with UK universities to highlight the value of pre-university study could be key to promoting the sector
- Specialist areas such as art and design should be promoted
- UK pre-university providers need to demonstrate the return on investment for Koreans
