3. Impact of marketing plan

This schools tour was designed to be a low cost high impact event. The plan was to visit some of the key supplier schools to enable universities to build relationships with the career teachers as well as engage students through interactive sessions. In this way, the individual institutions would market themselves as well as promote the UK as a destination for higher education.

4. Conclusions and follow up

4.1 Key recommendations for institutions

The schools visited found the tour useful to the students as it allowed for individual one to one sessions as well as time for student engagement through the talks and presentations. The talks on personal statements, Law, GIS and employability were found to be very beneficial and mind opening to students as well as the teachers. The career teachers in particular found it helpful to have university representatives on their school grounds as it meant quality attention to their students. Institutions are encouraged to consider bringing along academics or researchers to make interactive presentations in a wide range of subjects.

4.2 Key recommendations for the British Council

The results from the visitor survey and observations made demonstrated that the tour was 'really good' and it complemented the private schools fair that took place immediately afterwards. The choice of schools – British Curriculum Schools, IB, American system was found to be excellent. The timing was also found to be ideal as it was at a time when students start making decisions on where to apply. To quote one of the comments, 'the tour was well organised and great schools. BC staff were very professional and very friendly'. The schools also commended the initiative by the British Council to take UK institutions to their schools and they would like a larger number of universities to visit next time.

On the improvements side things, the schedule was found to have been very tight and it was recommended that it would be good to spend extra time (hour an hour suggested) in each school in order to allow institutions to speak to all students or indeed some extra time to speak with the school counsellors. Schools had agreed to allow us a maximum of 2 hours visit in their schools as they try to minimise disruptions to classes as much as possible. However, in their feedback, a half of the schools visited also found the visits guite short and would consider allowing the visit for an up to an extra one hour. During our next tour, we shall negotiate with the schools to allow for additional time. The other recommendation that was made was for the British Council to consider organising a pre event dinner or drinks receptions with schools counsellors so that they could meet one to one before participating in the events at their schools. We are already considering this and will factor it in while planning for our next event. The trip to Nakuru - Molo took 4 hours by road in the morning for our first visit which was to start at 10.00 hours. That meant we had a very early morning rise/drive. As such, it has been recommended that instead of travelling to in the morning, we travel the night/afternoon of the day before the event. This is something we entirely agreed with and are already working out schedule that will allow for travel on the day before the event. 'The hotel accommodation in Nakuru could have been better...' Nakuru is a small town and lacks the ambience of the kind found in hotels in the bigger cities like Nairobi. However, there does exist world class tourist lodges that are quite expensive and also located away from Nakuru town. We are looking into negotiating prices in a modestly priced hotel that will make a good alternative for our next visit.

The above points are very important and make good feedback to all parties but should not detract from what was a hugely successful tour and in the words of one commentator 'Overall though, the tour was a great success and I would welcome the opportunity to attend again'. We will be posting our next date on the SIEM website. As there will be general elections in Kenya in August, wide consultations among the schools and other stakeholders are underway to determine if we push all the schools fair in Kenya further to October.
