# Key campaign facts:

- More than 310,000 international students choose to study in the UK. That's 5.4% of student population
- 60% of people think that international students bring money into their local economy; only 12 % think they take money out. National ICM poll.
- £3.4bn of off campus expenditure from non-EU students (rent, food, transport, entertainment etc.) supports a significant number of jobs in surrounding towns, cities and regions. Almost 137,000 jobs are generated in the UK as a result of international students coming to study here.
- Only a minority of people see international students as immigrants (22%). National ICM poll.
- 75% of people think international students should be allowed to stay and work after they graduate.
