It is considered to be an umbrella term encompassing transnational/borderless/offshore education and refers to the mobility of all aspects of higher education: institution, programme, faculty and students. This assumes higher importance today as nations, institutions and students place a premium on the competitive edge provided by internationalization. It however faces criticism today due to its being considered elitist at all levels, its perceived inability to help create an egalitarian society, and other recent security related issues.</i></p>
